

Engaging California's Healthcare System to End Domestic Violence

Domestic Violence Health Care Partnerships Project

Blue Shield of California Foundation believes that the health and well-being of communities requires a systemic response to end domestic violence that includes healthcare providers who understand the health impact of domestic violence and can act as catalysts for change.

Domestic Violence Health Care Partnerships (DVHCP) Project

- Integrates healthcare and domestic violence systems through community collaborations across California.
- Provides training and support for healthcare providers to improve patient screening and access to domestic violence services.
- Trains domestic violence advocates on providing client access to health care.

Model 4

Provider's internal behavioral health department directly connected to domestic violence services.

Model 1

Co-located facility that places a domestic violence advocate in the healthcare setting to support providers and patients.

Model 2

Onsite health and/or women's health advocate with domestic violence expertise.

Model 3

Offsite domestic violence advocate who has an established relationship with local healthcare provider for direct referrals.

Early Successes

- 764 healthcare providers have been trained on domestic violence prevention, assessment, and methods of response.
- of patients seen at a DVHCP organization reported receiving information about healthy relationships and how to access help, with 60% reporting that it was either "very helpful" or "helpful."
- 82% of clients reported an increased understanding of the effects of domestic violence on personal health after being seen at a DVHCP organization.
